Remembrance within a Eucharistic Rite

The Act of Remembrance may be used in three positions in the Liturgy, depending on time.

- 1. At the start, after or instead of the prayers of penitence. The Remembrance and Commemoration should be said. The Commitment should be used as Prayer after Communion.
- 2. In the centre of the liturgy, instead of the Prayers of Intercession. In those Rites with a central offering of the Peace, this becomes the natural conclusion of The Remembrance. The Commitment should be used as the Prayer after Communion.
- 3. At the end of the Liturgy the Act of Remembrance and The Commitment lead naturally into the conclusion of the whole act of worship.

This Post Communion collect may be used by the celebrant or said altogether using the "our" form.

Strengthen for service, Lord, the *(our)* hands that have taken holy things; may the *(our)* ears which have heard your word be deaf to clamour and dispute; may the *(our)* tongues which have sung your praise be free from deceit:

may the *(our)* eyes which have seen the tokens of your love shine with the light of hope;

and may the *(our)* bodies which have been fed with your body be refreshed with the fullness of your life; glory to you for ever. Amen.

As published in The Promise of His Glory

Remembrance Sunday is observed on the second Sunday in November, generally the Sunday nearest to 11 November.

Since 1968, a Service for Remembrance Sunday has been commended for general use by the Archbishops of Canterbury, of York, and of Wales, the Cardinal Archbishop of Westminster, and the Moderator of the Free Church Federal Council. This service was reissued in 1984 with modest updating of the language and a fresh choice of hymns. The 1984 text is set out below.

Almighty God, our heavenly Father, infinite in wisdom, love, and power: have compassion on those for whom we pray; and help us to use all suffering in the cause of your kingdom; through him who gave himself for us on the cross, Jesus Christ your Son, our Lord. **Amen.**
